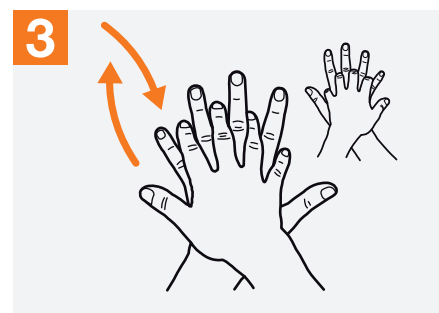
How to Handrub

RUB HANDS FOR HAND HYGIENE! WASH HANDS WHEN VISIBLY SOILED

 Duration of the entire procedure: 20-30 seconds



Apply a palmful of the product in a cupped hand, covering all surfaces;



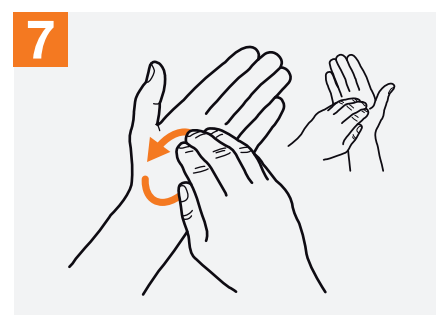
Right palm over left dorsum with interlaced fingers and vice versa;



Rotational rubbing of left thumb clasped in right palm and vice versa;



Palm to palm with fingers interlaced;



Rotational rubbing, backwards and forwards with clasped fingers of right hand in left palm and vice versa;



Rub hands palm to palm;




Backs of fingers to opposing palms with fingers interlocked;




Once dry, your hands are safe.

How to Handwash?

WASH HANDS WHEN VISIBLY SOILED! OTHERWISE, USE HANDRUB

 Duration of the handwash (steps 2-7): 15-20 seconds

 Duration of the entire procedure: 40-60 seconds



Wet hands with water;



Apply enough soap to cover all hand surfaces;



Rub hands palm to palm;



Right palm over left dorsum with interlaced fingers and vice versa;



Palm to palm with fingers interlaced;



Backs of fingers to opposing palms with fingers interlocked;



Rotational rubbing of left thumb clasped in right palm and vice versa;



Rotational rubbing, backwards and forwards with clasped fingers of right hand in left palm and vice versa;



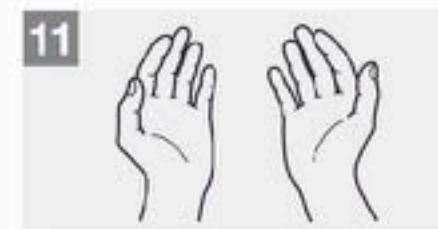

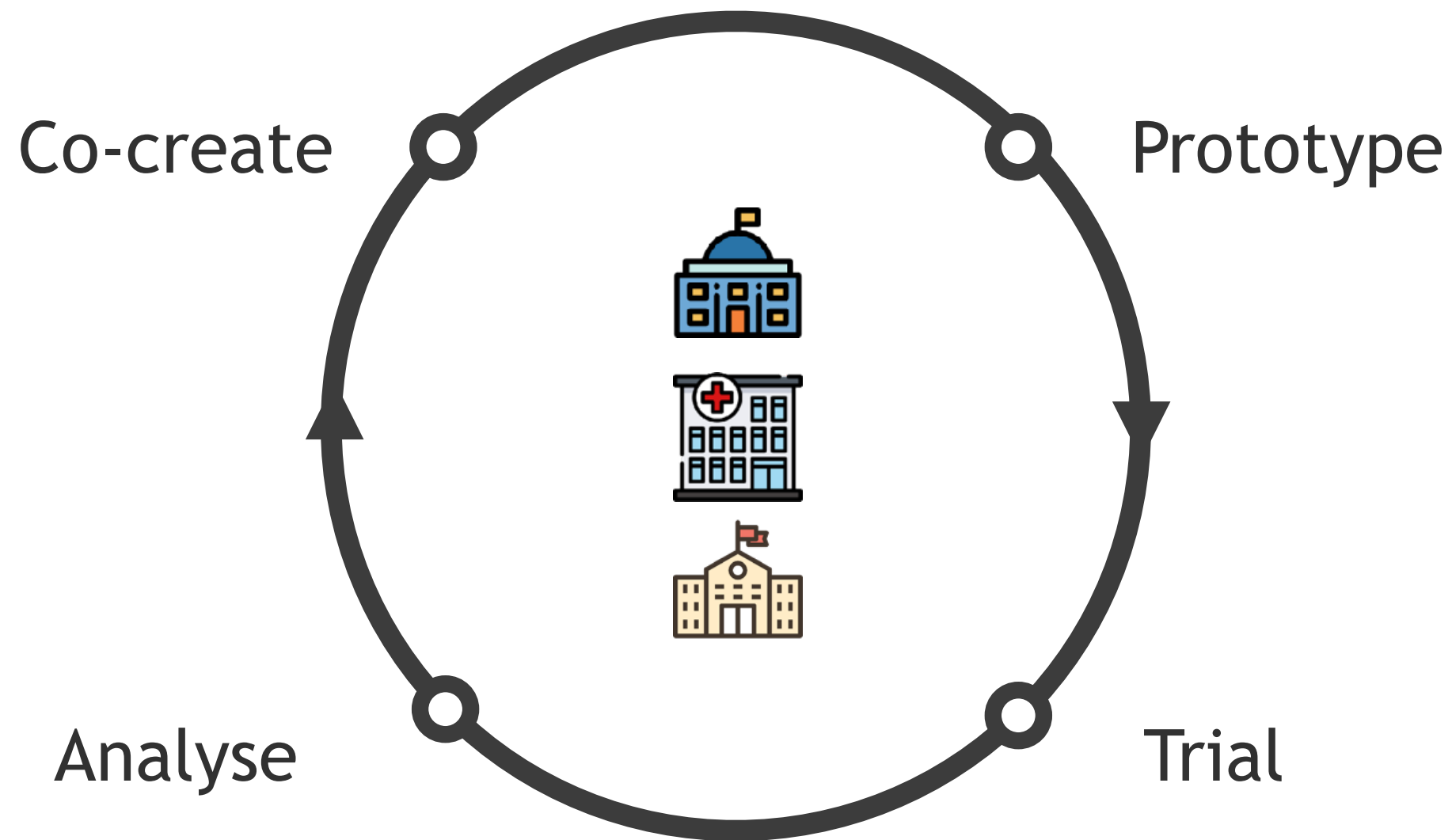
This is the first step from the standard hand washing process from WHO; however, it seems like you may need to prolong the duration of hand washing.

Innovation beyond hospitals

Lessons learned

- The focus of our work is not “owned” by medical experts
 - Good: we do not become “programers”
 - Bad: who drives this? Need support from higher management.
- This is a highly regulated space
 - Linking our work to a regulation makes it highly attractive
- Health funding can be very different from “science”
 - Attending dinner balls to attract donations
- Path to commercialisation?
 - After funding & trials
- Small seed funding is **CRUCIAL** to enable this work
 - You don’t need millions to get things done
- How to make a contribution when solving others’ problems?
 - Be selective about which problems you solve!
 - Strong grounding of work, compelling motivation.
